The booster vaccination

- The Standing Committee on Vaccination recommends that everyone aged 18 or over should get a booster 'messenger RNA' vaccination.
- In order to be eligible for this you must have been given your second vaccination at least six months ago.
- Priority groups for the booster vaccination are:
 - People aged 70 or over,
 - People who live in care homes, social integration centres and other facilities for at-risk groups of people, or who are cared for or looked after in such facilities, as well as
 - people with weakened immune systems.
- When you come for your booster vaccination, please bring proof of having received your first and second vaccinations as well an ID document.

Important information

Who can have a vaccination:

The Standing Committee on Vaccination (STIKO) recommends that everyone aged 12 and over should be vaccinated unless there are medical reasons for not doing so.

Where can I get vaccinated?

- at your GP's/doctor's surgery
- at private healthcare clinics
- at your workplace medical facility
- at a local drop-in vaccination clinic

Who pays for the vaccination?

The vaccination is free.

What documents do I have to bring with me to my vaccination appointment?

- Your vaccination certificate (if you have one)
- Your sickness fund membership card / information leaflet for showing to the doctor.
- An ID document (residence permit, temporary stay permit / exceptional leave to remain permit, passport etc.)

The vaccination

- All the approved vaccines are effective and low-risk according to the latest scientific findings.
- In the case of most vaccines it's necessary to have a second vaccination a few weeks after the first one.
- Vaccinated people help to prevent the spread of coronavirus.
- In most cases, the vaccination provides protection from a serious illness
